Bombay is often regarded as India's Capital of Hope. It consists of seven islands, joined by land reclamation. Many Indians, especially those from the rural areas, regard Bombay as their paradise, since they could find work relatively easy here, as compared to their homelands. Being the pillar for revenue collection, Bombay's economic growth has far outperformed the other cities. In fact, it's per capita production of goods and services is about three times greater than that of Delhi – India's second most prosperous city. But, despite the economic boom, Bombay gives us an astonishing image of deterioration.

Though unemployment is not a significant problem in Bombay, housing is. A visit in Dharavi, a slum area in Bombay, will help clarify out imagination. The Bombayites' so called "houses" are actually movable shacks, built from unwanted bits of tarpaulin, tin and cardboard. There are so many of them along with groups of scantily clad kids and hungry, stray dogs, about twelve or more Bombayites living in each hut, these two-storey houses are usually partitioned by rough platforms with ceilings no higher than five feet from the ground.

In spite of the poor living conditions, many Indians still hope to migrate to Bombay, especially to find jobs and make earnings.
